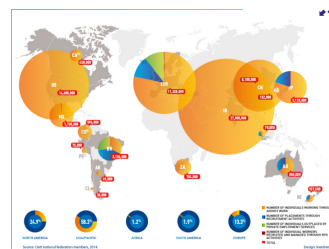

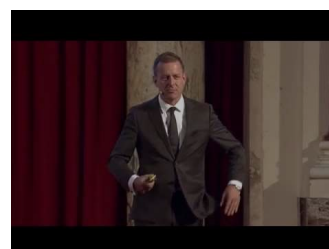
When I study the future of work, and explore the emerging trends impacting our working lives, I am struck how it looks increasingly like the past.

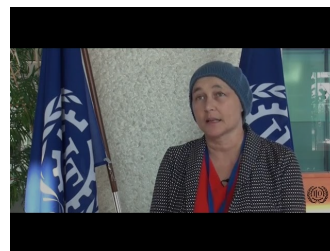
